

POST-OPERATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

ADENOIDECTOMY

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What can I expect after the operation?

- Children usually recover quickly after this operation
- The adenoid is at the back of the nose, behind the palate, so the site where the operation was performed can't be seen by looking in the mouth
- Some bloodstained saliva is not uncommon. Fresh blood is a concern
- A breathy voice or regurgitating food through the nose is rare occurrence. This should improve within 2 weeks

*****Stay within 15-20 minutes of medical assistance in case of bleeding*****

What should I give my child for pain relief?

- Regular Paracetamol every 6 hours is usually sufficient
 - This is not a particularly painful operation
- Nurofen (Ibuprofen) can be used occasionally between Paracetamol doses but should not be used regularly

What can I do to aid my child's recovery?

- **Encourage them to keep eating as normally as they can.** This reduces the chance of infection and of bleeding
- Maintain regular fluid intake to avoid dehydration

What should my child avoid?

- Medications that thin the blood- Aspirin or anti-inflammatory medications
- Very hot meals or baths
- Heavy lifting, straining, strenuous exercise

What should I look out for?

- If your child spits up any blood, complains of increasing pain or their oral intake drops off, you should call me. This may be a sign of infection

What happens if my child has bleeding?

- Your child is at risk of bleeding for up to 2 weeks after surgery
- Teenagers should gargle ice water in the first place
- If the bleeding does not settle in 5-10 minutes call me, seek urgent medical advice or call an ambulance to take you to the nearest emergency department

When do we have follow-up?

- Your first appointment will be around 2 weeks after surgery
